Although we were spoiled with a mild winter this past year, it's always refreshing to welcome the longer days and warmer weather that comes with the spring season. Soon we will be enjoying baseball games and backyard barbecues with family and friends. This spring also brings about a bittersweet moment as we welcome a new member to the Village Board, **Josh Hagen**, and say farewell to long time board member, **John Huemann**. John has been serving the Village as a trustee and Chairman of the Economic Development Committee for 24 years. I look back on all that has been accomplished over the

past couple of decades and I realize how much of it would not have been possible without John's hard work and commitment to our great community. As Village President and a friend, I am very grateful not only for John's service to the Village, but his commitment to the entire community and our service organizations, as well as his generous

sponsorship of community events. I would be remiss if I did not also recognize the contributions by the entire Huemann family. When attending any Village or local service organization event, you will always find a member of the Huemann family there lending a helping hand. I wish John well in his retirement from public service.

PROJECTS AND CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

In the Midwest, it is often said we experience only two seasons – winter and construction. Although road construction projects can create aggravating challenges, they also bring about beneficial improvements. A great example is the reconstruction of **Church Street** that is about to begin after more than 20 years in the making. Improvements will start at Hillcrest Place and continue east to just short of the intersection of Johnsburg Road. This project will greatly improve the safe movement of vehicles, bikes and pedestrians in an area that is always busy with activity. Village staff will keep you informed of temporary road closures and other construction impacts via e-blasts, Facebook and Twitter. Please proceed cautiously when traveling through the construction area and use alternate routes when possible.

I am honored to report that the Village recently received the **Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting** award from the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) for its comprehensive annual financial report for the fiscal year ended April 30, 2016. I would like to thank Village Administrator **Claudett Peters** and Village Accountant **Kim Giovanni** for their efforts in making the award possible; in addition I want to thank Village Trustee and Finance Chairman **Mary Lou Hutchinson** and the **Finance Committee** for the work they have done over the past several years to help position the Village to pursue the recognition. The Certificate of Achievement is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting, and its attainment represents a significant accomplishment by the Village and its management. Great job!

Just in time for the boating season, the **boat launch** located on Riverview Drive at **Alfred May Park** has reopened. I thank Trustee **Kevin McEvoy**, and Village Engineer **Tim Hartnett** for the well thought out plan, and proper phasing of this project. Over the winter, improvements were made to improve the ramp and pier and more improvements are planned for the future that will help protect the shoreline and improve the overall use of the launch. Stickers are required to use the launch and can be obtained at the Village Hall at 1515 Channel Beach Avenue, Monday through Friday between 8:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. Please make certain to obtain the required sticker before utilizing the launch to avoid costly citations.

Last summer, parking lot improvements were completed at the **Public Works facility** which will enable the police department to house police squads when not in use. Work is currently underway to install additional bathrooms and a squad room which will enable officers to check in at the facility and pick up their assigned squad prior to their shift. These improvements are being done to address the strain on parking and office space at the present police department facility.

Also, a **pedestrian warning signal** is now installed at the intersection of Johnsburg Road and Channel Beach Avenue which will help alert drivers to pedestrians attempting to cross the road to get to the Village Hall and Sunnyside Memorial Park. All of these projects would not have been possible without the foresight and efforts of Village's management, Finance Committee and Village Board who were instrumental in establishing a well thought out and effective **Capital Improvement Plan**. By planning for new capital pursuits and the maintenance and replacement of existing capital items, we are financially prepared to accommodate their impact.

As I write this article, the **Sunnyside Beach Sewer** project is nearing completion. Soon, 33 households along Sunnyside Beach Drive will be able to connect to the Village's wastewater treatment system. This is yet another long awaited project.

Last summer the Village experienced a rise in the usage of **golf carts**. I would like to remind residents that the Village does permit the use of golf carts and certain utility vehicles on village streets provided that they meet specific requirements. In order to operate these vehicles on village streets, you must have a valid driver's license; they must be inspected by the Johnsburg Police Department for proper equipment; and it must be registered with the Village. A registration fee applies. In addition, we caution residents to stay off the main roads using the golf carts. If you have any questions or concerns about your golf cart and routes that should be taken, please give the Police Department a call at 815-385-6024.

COMMUNITY EVENTS AND CONTRIBUTIONS

The annual Memorial Day event hosted by the **Johnsburg VFW Post #11496, Johnsburg Community Club and Johnsburg Lions Club** is right around the corner. MEMORIAL DAY IN JOHNSBURG



Memorial Day in Johnsburg is a patriotic event like no other. Gather your family and join fellow friends and neighbors to honor veterans, both past and present on Memorial Day, **MONDAY**, **MAY 29TH**. Attendees can park at the Johnsburg State Bank or the Community Club before the riverside ceremony. A township bus will be available to transport people to the bridge before 8:30AM and before 10:30AM for those unable to walk to the community club for the final ceremony starting about 10:30AM.

Plan to be on the bridge sidewalk by 8:30AM to observe and enjoy the patriotic performances of the Johnsburg High School band, choir and buglers. The Johnsburg VFW will conduct the opening ceremony at 9AM at the Waterfront Hotel & Marina riverfront patio by the Chapel Hill Bridge. A river wreath ceremony will follow to honor those lost at sea during naval battles. Flying aircraft are again part of this year's ceremonies. After the events conclude at the Waterfront Hotel & Marina, a parade will proceed to the Johnsburg Community Club's Armed Forces Memorial for a concluding ceremony. The parade will travel along Chapel Hill Road through the roundabout, west onto Johnsburg Road and end at Rescue Squad Memorial Park. A ceremony will then be held immediately following the parade at the Johnsburg Community Club Armed Forces Flag Memorial. A baseball game, sponsored by the Johnsburg Community Men's Club (JCMC), will follow. Antique and military vehicles will also be on display. Food and beverages will be served picnic-style by the Johnsburg Lions Club and JCMC members will tend the bar in the clubhouse.

SPRING BRUSH PICKUP

The Johnsburg Public Works Department will be conducting its annual spring brush pickup beginning Monday, JUNE 5, 2017. This service is being provided for larger branches generated from trimming or storm damage and is not intended for disposal of whole trees that have been removed. *ALL BRUSH MUST BE PLACED BY THE ROAD NO LATER THAN TAM ON JUNE 5TH.* Crews will make one pass through each subdivision. Any

branches placed by the road after they go by will not be picked up at a later time. All BRANCHES MUST BE A MINIMUM OF 4 FEET IN LENGTH AND NO GREATER THAN 6 INCHES IN DIAMETER. They must be placed with their cut ends pointed towards the road in a neat and orderly pile. Branches that cannot be put through the chipper safely will not be taken. Evergreen cuttings must be kept separate from other tree branches and will be picked up separately.

TEN WATER SAVING TIPS

Water conservation helps prevent water pollution in nearby lakes, rivers and local watersheds and can help reduce your utility bill. You can do your part by following these recommendations:

1. CHECK FAUCETS AND PIPES FOR LEAKS. A small drip from a worn faucet washer can waste 20 gallons of water per day. Larger leaks can waste hundreds of gallons.

2. DON'T USE THE TOILET AS A WASTEBASKET. Every time you flush facial tissue or other small bits of trash, five to seven gallons of water is wasted.

3. CHECK YOUR TOILETS FOR LEAKS. Put a little food coloring in your toilet tank. If, without flushing, the color begins to appear in the bowl within 30 minutes, you have a leak that should be repaired immediately. Most replacement parts are inexpensive and easy to install.

4. IF YOU ARE ON A WATER SYSTEM AND HAVE A WATER METER, USE YOUR WATER METER TO CHECK FOR HIDDEN WATER LEAKS. Read the house water meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is being used. If the meter does not read exactly the same, there is a leak.

5. Install water-saving shower heads and low-flow faucet aerators . Long, hot showers can use five to ten gallons every minute. Using a water-saving shower head means it uses less than 2.5 gallons per minute. Fitting all household faucets with aerators is the single best home water conservation method and it is also the cheapest!

6. Insulate your water pipes. It's easy and inexpensive to insulate your water pipes with pre-slit foam pipe insulation. You'll get hot water faster plus avoid wasting water while it heats up.

7. Use your dishwasher and clothes washer for only full loads. Automatic dishwashers and clothes washers should be fully loaded for optimum water conservation. Most makers of dishwashing soap recommend not prerinsing dishes for a big water savings. With clothes washers, avoid the permanent press cycle, which uses an additional 5 gallons for the extra rinse.

8. MINIMIZE USE OF KITCHEN SINK GARBAGE DISPOSAL. In-sink 'garburators' require lots of water to operate properly, and also add considerably to the volume of solids in a septic tank which can lead to maintenance problems. Start a compost pile as an alternate method of disposing food waste.

HOW IMPORTANT IS IT TO HAVE A BUILDING PERMIT?

F WORK IS DONE WITHOUT REQUIRED PERMITS, YOU CAN FACE FINES, THE NEED TO REDO WORK AND PROBLEMS WHEN SELLING. This isn't an area where you want to beg forgiveness rather than ask permission.

Permits can also be a form of consumer protection. A contractor who won't pull required permits might lack appropriate licensing. That's something you should know before a project starts. Permits require a code-enforcement inspector to sign off on work at various stages, depending on the type of project. That provides assurance that the framing, plumbing, electrical or other work meets code. Also, a lack of required permits may affect your home's insurance coverage.



Skipping remodeling permits may cost you. If local authorities discover work done without proper authorization, you will be fined. Also, you may end up paying twice for work because the code-enforcement department may require you to remove drywall to inspect work. Other work you already paid for may also have to be redone.

Unauthorized work may also be discovered when future buyers hire an inspector, who may seek records related to improvements. The seller may end up paying fines and having problems selling the home.

But how do you know what projects require a permit? The easiest way is to contact the Village Hall at (815) 385-6023 and ask. Generally speaking, any improvement that changes the home's electrical, plumbing or structural systems requires a permit. This means adding on to the home or moving walls inside the existing structure, especially if the walls are load bearing.

Use of Golf Carts on Village Roads



With the summer weather approaching here are a few reminders regarding the use of nonhighway vehicles. Golf carts and other qualified non-highway vehicles may be driven on streets within the Village's corporate boundaries with the exception of Johnsburg Road, Ringwood Road and any county roads. Signs have been posted on streets where golf carts are allowed.

In order to drive these vehicles in the Village, you must be 16 years of age, have a valid driver's license and complete the mandatory annual inspection of your vehicle. The initial cost to register your non-highway vehicle is \$50 and renewals are \$10. This fee includes the cost of a sticker which is required to be displayed. If you have a golf cart or other allowable utility vehicle, or are thinking of purchasing one, please review Chapter 15.15 of the Johnsburg Municipal Code regulating their use. This code can be viewed on the Village's website and at the Village Hall. You may print the non-highway vehicle application from the Village of Johnsburg's website. **Note that the use of four wheelers, motorBikes and other all-terrain vehicles with saddle seats are prohibited on Village streets.**

WHAT NOT TO FLUSH

There are many things that should NEVER be flushed down the toilet. And to dispose of them via the toilet is to risk significant plumbing problems as well as environmental pollution.

1. BATHROOM WIPES – These "moist towelettes" are becoming an increasingly popular bathroom accessory. Despite the fact that they're marketed to be flushed like toilet paper, these wipes are creating clogs and backups in sewer systems around the nation.



2. COTTON BALLS & SWABS - It seems like these tiny tools would just get soggy and eventually breaks down in the watery pipeline, but they don't. They eventually gather together in bends of the pipe, causing massive blockages.

3. PRESCRIPTION MEDICATION – Many people feel like they're doing the safe thing, keeping meds out of the wrong hands by flushing them, but it's actually very dangerous. These drugs destroy bacteria, contaminate groundwater supplies and can have terrible effects on wildlife downstream.

4. PAPER TOWELS – These are extremely wasteful and reusable rags/napkins are much better. However, if you do use paper towels, know that they're NOT designed to break down in water like toilet paper. Flushing them can cause BIG problems.

5. CIGARETTE BUTTS – Not only do they look nasty when floating in the toilet water, they're full of incredibly toxic chemicals that just end up in the water supply.

6. BAND-AIDS – These are made from non-biodegradable plastic, which is terrible for the environment and can cause terrible clogs in the sewage system.

7. DENTAL FLOSS – Despite feeling like string, dental floss is not biodegradable. Once flushed, it loves to wrap itself around other objects in the pipeline, making tiny clogs bigger in an instant.

8. FATS, OIL AND GREASE – This is a tough one, and everyone has done it at one point, but cooking fats should NEVER go in the drain or garbage disposal. It seems like a liquid when it's hot, but as soon as this grease hits the drain, it cools and congeals, becoming pipe-clogging wax. Scrape it into the trash.

9. CAT LITTER – It's just the cat's poop and pee, right? But cat litter is made from clay and sand, two things that you should NEVER be put down a toilet. Not to mention that cat waste contains toxins and parasites that shouldn't be in our water system.

10. DISPOSABLE DIAPERS – Just because there's poop in it, doesn't mean it belongs in the toilet. Diapers are made from toxic plastic that's designed to expand when it comes in contact with water. In the slim chance you actually get it down the drain, it will instantly be caught in the u-bend, and cause a terrible back up.
