Village President's <u>f</u>etter

I would like to begin this article by expressing my heartfelt thanks to the incredible citizens of Johnsburg. The past 18 months brought about inconceivable challenges to our community. Even though the resulting economic and lifestyle impacts of the pandemic have been severe, our community rose to the challenge. The recent resurgence in COVID 19 cases and return to face masks may have many people feeling discouraged, but I urge you to stay strong and continue to do what we need to do as a community to overcome the pandemic.

Despite the challenges we encountered, many positive activities have been occurring in Johnsburg over the past several months. One of the most obvious is the construction of the David G. Dominguez Municipal Center. The project will enable our Police and Administration Departments to operate under one roof, creating more efficiencies in our operations and providing our police department personnel the accommodations they need to carry out their duties. The project is expected to be substantially complete before the end of the year and an official dedication and open house is tentatively planned for Sunday, May 15, 2022. Read the article on Page 6 for more information about this project.

Progress is also being made on the extension of sewers into the North Sewer Service Area. Expanding our sewer system to serve businesses along North Johnsburg Road has been a Village priority for several years. This project will take the sewers from their current terminus on Sunnyside Beach Drive, north to Lakeview Avenue. It will enable the system to serve residents and businesses in need of wastewater treatment alternatives such as Angelo's Market, Raymond's Bowl, Sunnyside Tavern and Johnsburg Mobile. The extension sets the platform for future extensions into adjacent neighbors and eventually up to the Oakcreek Townhomes property. The timing of the project, which is also expected to be completed before the end of the year, will also enable us to connect the David G. Dominguez Municipal Center to the system.

We have been working with the residents on Sunnyside Beach Drive who expressed a desire to bring their privately maintained road up to Village standards so that future maintenance can be handled by the Village. This project has been a few years in the making, but I am pleased to announce that it is now moving forward. A Special Service Area has been established to enable the residents to pay for the cost of the improvement through their tax bill over a twenty-year period bonds were recently secured



and engineering design is underway. By this time next year, the residents will be getting ready to cut the ribbon on their new road! If you reside on a privately maintained road and want to learn more about what your neighborhood can do to improve your road, contact Village Administrator Claudett Sofiakis at the Village Hall.

Another exciting project that has been long in the works is the Chapel Hill Road sidewalk improvement. In November of 2018, the Village applied for a Safe Routes to School Grant to cover the cost of the project. We were thrilled when we were notified that we were awarded the grant and eager to get the project underway. Two and a half years later, our sidewalks are in, proving that good things do come to those who wait.

Many residents have contacted the Village about the status of the Johnsburg Road bridge at Riverside Drive. In response to ongoing deterioration of some of the beams supporting the bridge, the McHenry County Division of Transportation instituted additional lane shifts for both east and westbound traffic and the left turn lane onto Riverside Drive to mitigate stress on the impacted beams. When implementing the lane modifications, additional delineators and a "tuff curb" were installed to help direct traffic through the affected area. The McHenry County Division of Transportation has slated the bridge for rehabilitation, however the engineering/approval process can be lengthy and construction may not occur for several years. Until that time, adjustments will continue to be implemented when necessary to reduce the stress on the bridge's support structures and insure the public's safety. Social distancing resulting from the pandemic steered people towards other activities, one of which was touring around Johnsburg in golf carts and UTVs. Since the onset of the coronavirus, the number of non-highway vehicle registrations has nearly doubled. For many, this new past time created a fun way for families to get out and enjoy the community while practicing safe social distancing from others. The Village is working on establishing an off road path network to create a means of travel for non-highway vehicles in areas where they are not permitted to travel on roadways. A local golf-cart club, known as the J-town Cart Club raised \$9,000 to help cover the cost of the paths and signage. The Johnsburg Lions Club contributed \$3,000 of those funds and they continue to support the program through their annual golf cart raffle and Cart Cruise for Charity event which has been greatly successful. Watch for a non-highway vehicle map to be released in the near future.


The Berkshire of Johnsburg development, located on the former Bush School site, is nearly complete and expected to be open before the end of the year. The facility will provide 68 affordable housing units for persons 55 years of age and older. In addition to revitalizing the former school site with a housing product not currently available in Johnsburg, the developers also made improvements to the Village's water and sewer systems in the downtown area and will be resurfacing Johnsburg Road from Fairview Avenue to the roundabout. We are excited about this fantastic addition to our community.

Shortly, work will begin in Dutch Creek Bay as the Fox Waterway Agency begins a much needed dredging project to improve boat travel in the area. The project, which was spearheaded by the Dutch Creek Homeowners Association, will be conducted over the next 2-3 months. To help control the cost of the project, some of the dredged material will be placed on the vacant property at the corner of Reed and Aspen to dry. It will then later be removed and sold as topsoil. The project has been made possible through the cooperative efforts of the Fox Water Agency, Dutch Creek Woodlands Homeowners Association, Village of Johnsburg and Joe Huemann. This is another great example of the Hometown with Spirit attitude that gets things done. Our parks have also been getting some attention. Late last year, new playground equipment and benches were installed at Rescue Squad Memorial Park thanks to a generous donation and two outcroppings were installed at the Village's fishing pond on Hickory Way Drive. Running Brook Farm Park received picnic tables and a new park bench and the Showcase Field at Hiller Park received a new home run fence. Three new score boards are expected to be installed at Hiller Park in the near future.

The decrease in COVID cases experienced throughout the summer allowed for the return of some community events, which have been greatly missed. The Community Affairs Committee pursued a new event this year called Party in the Burg. The event was very well attended with nearly 250 tickets sold Celebration in the Park also returned this year and plans are underway for Holiday Magic scheduled for Saturday, December 11th. Let's all do our part and stay safe so that we can help contain the virus and keep moving forward in our efforts to Restore Illinois and Johnsburg.

Residential Garbage, Recycling and Yard Waste Service

Beginning December 1, 2021, Lakes Disposal, Inc. will provide residential garbage, recycling and yard waste services to all single family homes and townhomes in Johnsburg. Under the new contract, residents will receive a 95-gallon recycling toter and a 65- garbage toter. This base service level also allows residents to dispose of one bulk item per week and up to (8) biodegradable bags, cans or bundles of yard waste each week between April 1st and November 30th at no additional cost. The cost of the base service level for the first year is \$19.50 per month. Optional container rentals are available. Lakes Disposal Inc. will also provide for the disposal of electronic wastes, white goods and additional bulk items for an additional cost. (See below chart)


- 1 Applies to single family and multifamily residential curbside pickup only
- 2 Participating property owners will be billed directly by contractor
- 3 Covered, wheeled refuse toters are offered in three sizes (approximately 35, 65 and 95 gallons). The cost of the service varies based upon the size of the refuse container selected
- 4 A 95 gallon (approximate size) covered, wheeled recycling toter will be provided for weekly pick-up of recyclables
- 5 1 bulk item may be placed at the curb weekly at each residence for pick-up. Bulk items include sofas, tables, mattresses box springs, etc. White goods and electronics are not included but can be arranged for pickup for an additional cost
- 6 Pickup of up to 8 bags/cans/bundles of landscape waste included seasonally (April 1st-November 30th) Bags/Can shall be no larger than 35 gallons and weigh no more than 50 pounds each. Bundled brush shall not exceed 4 feet in length and weigh no more than 50 pounds each.
- 7 Pickup includes Christmas tree collection on the first two pickups in January

Residents desiring a larger or smaller size garbage toter will have the opportunity to make that selection prior to the start of the new contract. Watch your mail for more information from Lakes Disposal, Inc. regarding the new service. Containers are expected to be delivered during the last couple of weeks in November. Waste Management's last pickup day is Saturday November 27th (due to the Thanksgiving holiday). If you currently rent containers from Waste Management, please make sure to leave your container(s) at the curb following the November 27th pick. Waste Management will arrange to pick up your containers on November 27th or shortly thereafter.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY

Rick-or-Freat - Sunday, October 31st 3pm - 7pm

In light of the COVID-19 Pandemic, we urge everyone to be safe, practice social distancing and respect households that choose not to participate. More information will be provided in the coming weeks as the day approaches.

An easy way to deter potential problems is to make sure your house and your property are well lit. Light is one of the biggest deterrents for burglaries. Sus-

pects will most likely choose a dark residence over one that has clear visibility at night.

Extra caution needs to be taken while driving on Halloween not only during the night but during the day as well. Children tend to be pre-occupied with everything going on around them and not paying attention to safely crossing roads with par-

ents or in a crosswalk. If you are the parent of a trick-or-treater, please remind them of road safety and to watch out for cars when crossing the road. Choose paths that are lighted and are familiar to you and your child.

Other things to consider are:

- If you set jack-o'-lanterns on your porch with candles in them, make sure that they are far enough out of the way so that children's costumes will not accidentally be set on fire. Better yet, use battery-operated pumpkin lights.
- 2 Carry your cell phone and a flashlight.
- Ś Explain to your children that you need to check their candy before the eat any of it.



Make sure their costume does not restrict their movement or vision.

- 6 If your child will be carrying a prop such as a pitchfork or sword, make sure the tips are flexible enough to not cause injury if fallen on. Never carry real weapons.
- 6 Tell your children to never go into the home of a stranger or get into their car.
- Ø Make sure you set a time for your children to be home and stress the importance for them to be home at that time.
- **B** Control your pets: don't take a chance that your pet might be frightened and chase or bite a child at your door.

The parade will begin at First Midwest Bank and proceed along Church Street to the Johnsburg Community Club. A tree lighting ceremony will take place immediately following the parade. Open Burning of Landscape Waste

Landscape waste may be burned on Saturdays and Sundays from dawn through dusk during the months of October and November. The burning of landscape waste is permitted only when winds are less than 10 mph. The burning site must be a minimum of 100' from any principal structure and supervised at all times by an individual at least 18 years of age. A fire extinguisher, garden hose or water source must be available at the burning site. Prohibited at all times is the burning of manure, garbage, construction materials, litter, etc. on any property. Burning on public or private roads, alleys, sidewalks or easements is also prohibited. <u>We have seen and received multiple complaints of residents not complying with the ordinance. Please be advised violators will be cited and fines assessed.</u>

Recreational fires and ceremonial fires are exempt but may not be larger than 3'x3'x3' and cannot contain leaves, grass or shrubbery clippings.

Overnight Parking Prohibited

The Village of Johnsburg has an ordinance that prohibits parking for all vehicles on any village street between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. (Municipal Code Chapter 15.07 All Night Parking); however, permission to park on the street overnight may be granted for certain hardships. You may request permission to park on the street at https://www.frontlinepss.com/johnsburg or contact the Police Department Non-Emergency directly at (815) 385-6024.

Address Identification



It is important that address identification numbers are properly displayed on your property. Address numbers are required to be a minimum of 4 inches tall and ½ inch thick. The numbers should be reflective and clearly visible from the street, day or night. If plac-

ing numbers on a mailbox adjacent to the street, it is recommended that numbers be placed on both sides of the mailbox for ease of identification. Proper identification of your home or business helps Police, and Fire Rescue First Responders quickly locate your address in case of an emergency – when seconds count! Please take the time to make sure that your property has identification numbers attached that are visible from the street during the day and night.

First Tee Golf Program at Chapel Hill Golf 🥢

Johnsburg is proud to offer the First Tee golf program at Chapel Hill Golf Course each year to get our Johnsburg youth golfing as early as 7 years old. The First Tee – Greater Chicago's mission is to impact the lives of young people ages 7-18 by providing educational programs that

build character, instill life-enhancing values and promote healthy choices through the game of golf. With the belief that all kids deserve the chance to grow in a supportive environment with mentors guiding them, First Tee is dedicated to building programs that are accessible, welcoming, and as impactful as they are fun.

How did this program come to Johnsburg?

In the fall of 2018 Raven Davis a physical education teacher at Ringwood School Primary Center, was awarded a grant from First Tee to begin a school program serving Kindergarten through 5th grade students. The grant provided all of the equipment needed to implement the program.

After getting this grant it was vital to carry it over to the community of Johnsburg. In the summer of 2019 the summer golf program was kicked off at the Village's Chapel Hill Golf Course in combination with Pro Circle Driving range in Spring Grove. Since then the program consistently has over 25 participants ages 7-15. The program has been offered weekly for the golfers and they split their time at Chapel Hill Golf Course and Pro Circle driving range with the help of Gary Shastal.

This summer a generous donation of over \$80,000 has been given to the Greater Chicago's Johnsburg programming site to improve coach training, supply equipment, and support those kids/families who would not otherwise be able to afford it. With this donation the First Tee of Johnsburg will be able to impact many youth golfers for many years to come. Utilities Inc· Proposed Rate Increase



The Village has been receiving calls from concerned residents regarding the rate increase once again being pursued by Utilities Inc. The increase, if approved, will affect residents in the northern and northeastern areas of the Village who receive water through the Utilities Inc. System. The Vil-

lage continues to advocate for quality and affordable drinking water for its residents through communications with the Illinois Commerce Commission and our State Representatives. Residents are oftentimes under the impression that the Village is able to intercede to prevent a rate increase from occurring. Unfortunately, that is not the case, but YOU can make a difference. If you are a customer of Utilities, Inc. and are concerned with how this most recent rate increase will impact you, we urge you to contact the Illinois Commerce Commission and make your concerns know. They can be reached at 800-524-0795 or email them at www.icc.illinois.gov/complaints. Additionally, contact your State and County representatives to voice your concerns. The Village has been working with citizens who have been pursuing legislation to help control water utility rate increases. Let your Representatives know how the rates are impacting you and urge them to support legislative changes that will control rate increases and make water more affordable.

Snow Removal



The Village of Johnsburg has a Snow Removal and Ice Control Policy in place to help insure safe roadways during inclement weather. As we prepare for winter weather, here are some things you should know:

- Hazards at the roadside, such as boulders or driveway markers that may interfere with or damage plows, must be removed before the first snowfall. In larger storms it can be difficult for our drivers to see the edge of the road.
- Major roads and bus routes are plowed first, followed by secondary subdivision streets and finally cul de sacs and private roads.
- There is no parking along the road on days when a 2-inch snowfall has occurred or is being fore-casted.
- Check your mailbox post to make sure it is sturdy enough to withstand snow being deflected from the plow. We will repair mailboxes only if they come in direct contact with the snowplow and will not repair them if the force of the snow knocks them down.
- Make sure the area around your mailbox is shoveled so mail can be delivered and around any fire hydrant that may be on your property.
- Increase the following distance when driving behind a snowplow. It is very difficult for the drivers to see cars directly behind them.
- The Public Works department will be clearing snow from the downtown, Johnsburg Road, St. Johns Avenue and Church Street sidewalks. AB-SOLUTELY NO snowmobiles are permitted on sidewalks or in the downtown area. Citations will be issued to snowmobilers who ride on sidewalks.

Use of Non-Highway vehicles on Village Roads



Golf carts and other qualified non-highway vehicles may be driven on streets within the Village's corporate boundaries when speed limit posting is less than 35mph with the exception of Johnsburg Road and Ringwood Road. They are also not permitted on any County road. Signs have been posted on streets where golf carts are allowed.

In order to drive these vehicles in the Village, you must be 16 years of age, have a valid driver's license, and have your vehicle registered with and inspected by the Village. Effective January 2022, license plates are required for all non-highway vehicles and a fee of \$75.00 (vanity) or \$60.00 (automatic numerical issue) shall be assessed for all new and renewal registrations. Once the vehicle is plated, the renewal fee of \$25.00 will be charged for the same vehicle each year thereafter. If you have a golf cart or other allowable utility vehicle, or are thinking of purchasing one, please review Chapter 15.15 of the Johnsburg Municipal Code regulating their use. This code can be viewed on the Village's website and at the Village Hall. You may print the non-highway vehicle application from the Village of Johnsburg's website. Note that the use of four wheelers, motorbikes and other all-terrain vehicles with saddle seats are prohibited on Village streets and violators will be ticketed.


