CITIZEN POLICE ACADEMY

The Johnsburg Police Department is proud to announce the second annual Citizen's Police Academy Class. A Citizen Police Academy is a program intended to educate citizens about police work and is designed to give the public a working knowledge of our department's organization, personnel, policies and procedures. The Citizen Police Academy is not designed as a preparatory class for individuals who desire to become a law enforcement officer. Rather, it is intended as an educational and informative offering for adults who both reside in our village and have a desire to learn more about their police department. Enrolled students will be encouraged to build a lasting partnership with the Department, with the ultimate goal of reducing crime and improving the quality of life in our neighborhoods.

The Citizen Police Academy topics will include the history and evolution of law enforcement, firearms familiarization, patrol tactics, gangs, drug enforcement, special response team operations, canine patrol, criminal law, crime prevention, media relations, crime scene processing, investigations, and others.

The Citizen Police Academy is scheduled to start in January of 2012. The Academy will meet once per week for a total of 9 three hour sessions. A variety of instructors from the Johnsburg Police Department, and guests, will be presenting an assortment of topics in order to provide the public with a comprehensive view of police work and the criminal justice system.

The Academy is offered free of charge to Johnsburg Citizens and business owners. Anyone interested in applying for the Academy must complete an application which involves a criminal background check and must meet the following criteria:

- Must be 21 years old or older
- No prior felony conviction
- No outstanding warrants
- No pending criminal cases

Regulations & Reminders

2011-2012 VEHICLE STICKERS


August 1st, 2011 was the deadline for having your vehicle sticker displayed. Any vehicle housed or registered in the Village for more than 30 days of the year must have a sticker displayed. Vehicles that

have temporary license plates also must have a sticker as do company vehicles being kept in the Village that do not have a sticker from the town in which they are registered. The Johnsburg Police Department is actively enforcing this ordinance. The cost of a citation for not displaying the sticker is \$50. Below are the prices for purchasing a sticker now.



PARK SHELTER FEES

In September, the Village Board approved Ordinance 11-12-07 which establishes fees for the use of park shelters. The ordinance was established in an effort to offset park maintenance costs. In addition to use fees, refundable deposits will also be required to cover the cost of cleanup should the party reserving the shelter fail to clean up after their event. Park shelter fees will go into effect in the Spring of 2012. PUBLIC WORKS NEWS SNOW REMOVAL

The Village of Johnsburg has a Snow Removal and Ice Control Policy in place to help insure safe roadways during inclement weather. As we prepare for winter weather, here are some things you should know:

- * Hazards at the roadside, such as boulders or driveway markers that may interfere with or damage plows, must be removed before the first snowfall. In larger storms it can be difficult for our drivers to see the edge of the road.
- * Major roads and bus routes are plowed first, followed by secondary subdivision streets and finally cul de sacs and private roads.
- * Please adhere to the "No Parking" along the road on days when a 2 inch snowfall has occurred or is being forecasted.
- * Check your mailbox post to make sure it is sturdy enough to withstand snow being deflected from the plow. We will repair mailboxes only if they come in direct contact with the snowplow and will not repair them if the force of the snow knocks them down.
- * Make sure the area around your mailbox is shoveled so mail can be delivered and around any fire hydrant that may be on your property.
- * Increase the following distance when driving behind a snowplow. It is very difficult for the drivers to see cars directly behind them.

CYBER BULLYING

Bullying is nothing new; it has been around since the beginning of time however, today's kids have the ability to utilize new technology to expand their reach and the extent of their harm. Online social networks have created great opportunity to access information from around the globe and keep in contact with friends but there are downsides to this social media - Cyber bullying. Simply put, cyber bullying is "willful and repeated harm inflicted through the use of computers, cell phones,

- •Set clear expectations for online behavior and phone use;
- •Be aware of changes in the mood or behavior of your child (this may be as a result of bullying); and
- Contact school administration for help in ending this behavior

We are committed to providing a safe environment in school so all students can focus on achieving the highest academic standards possible.



A district curriculum committee evaluated our strategies in educating students about bullying and cyber bullying and how to deal with these issues both in school and in our community. The committee studied curriculum that was not only researched based, but also focused on social emotional learning standards. They found exactly what they were looking for in a program titled "Second Step". This program will be taught to students at Ringwood and Bush School on a continuing basis.

Follow-up and reinforcement of these skills will continue in Junior High and High School. Our Junior High is also

incorporating a program titled "Rachel's Challenge". This is a program that can create a permanent positive culture change by starting a chain reaction of kindness and compassion. We are very excited about this new and updated approach to keeping our children safe.

November is National Diabetes Month

A compact florescent light bulb costs about \$8, but can last 10 times longer than a regular bulb. Better yet, these bulbs use about 75 percent less energy, saving the average homeowner approximately \$26 in energy bills over the bulb's lifetime.

- •Reduced emissions of nitrogen oxide, carbon dioxide, and sulfur dioxide into the environment for better air quality
- •Improved electricity system reliability
- •Reduced electrical and cooling loads in buildings
- •Lower electricity costs (roughly 10-15%)
- •Lower maintenance costs
- •More appropriate lighting levels
- •Natural lighting is aesthetically pleasing
