

Fiscal News

The Village Board recently completed the Annual Budget Review and adopted a balanced budget for fiscal year 2016. During the review, much discussion occurred regarding ongoing threats to State disbursed revenues, unfunded mandates and lack of sufficient revenues which continue to drive the need for the Village to seek alternatives to fund major components of its operations. For the past several years, the Village has implemented operational changes to reduce costs and build a capital fund necessary to meet our required short and long-term needs. Despite these efforts, road maintenance, residential garbage/recycling services, reserves and the police pension program remain underfunded resulting in a budget shortfall of more than \$800,000 annually. In order to approve a balanced budget and avoid deficit spending, the Village had to implement several cuts. Short-term adjustments allow for a temporary balancing of the budget, but do not support the fiscal framework necessary to attain the Village's strategic priorities. With that, we must factor in the broader view and economic realities that are shaping our future. Although we cannot expect an overnight fix, our financial plan must be able to demonstrate progress is being made towards sustainability and achieving our long-term goals.

This past year, the Village identified possible solutions and a survey was conducted to obtain input from residents to insure that fair and equitable solutions were implemented. Based upon the feedback received, the Village will be pursuing the following changes to secure the funds necessary to support the underfunded items:

<u>Residential Garbage and Recycling</u> - Beginning November 1, 2015, Waste Management will begin billing residents directly for residential garbage and recycling services. The Village will continue to contract for the service to insure that the best possible rates are obtained. The tax assessment for residential garbage and recycling services will be eliminated and your real estate tax bill will be reduced accordingly.

To operate in a fiscally sound manner direct services must be supported by established revenue streams to cover their costs. Taxes collected for residential garbage and recycling services continue to fall significantly short in supporting the cost of the service. The Village currently collects approximately \$210,000 through real estate taxes to pay for the service however the annual cost is more than \$382,000, causing the Village to utilize general fund dollars to make up the difference, a practice that has cost our Village over \$1,319,000 in the past 15 years. If the service continues to be funded in the current manner, the General Fund will contribute an additional \$1,364,341 over the next 7 years. By making this change, the Village will utilize the funds for capital expenditures and building cash reserves.

The Village Board unanimously concluded that utilizing general fund dollars to subsidize the residential garbage and recycling program was not the best use of taxpayer dollars and therefore agreed to decrease the Village's real estate tax rate by the amount collected for garbage and recycling services and implement a direct bill system through Waste Management. Service levels will continue to be the same, and residents will still be able to rent containers and contract for additional services if they so choose. Beginning in November, residents with the standard level of service of one garbage can and unlimited recycling will be charged a monthly rate of \$15.86 through Waste Management. Residents renting containers will also be charged a monthly rate of \$15.86 plus the cost of container rental(s). Garbage and recyclables will continue to be picked up on Friday.

Please watch you mail for more information regarding this important change.

Local Sales Tax – When seeking ways to help fund underfunded items it is preferable to implement alternatives through which the cost burden is not solely carried by our residents. With that in mind, the Village will be placing a referendum question on the March 2016 ballot asking voters to support a ½% sales tax increase. A ½% increase to our sales tax rate would result in approximately \$600,000 in additional revenues annually to be used for road resurfacing and other underfunded items. At the current time, consumers pay a 7% sales tax for goods purchased within the Village of Johnsburg while goods purchased in McHenry are taxed at a 7 ½% rate. Increasing the Village's sales tax rate would place the Village's rate equal to competing retailers in the neighboring community while bringing in much needed funds to support road resurfacing. Additionally, the cost burden would be shared by all consumers shopping in our community and not just our residents.




Fall Brush Pickup

The Johnsburg Public Works Department will be conducting its annual fall brush pickup beginning September 21, 2015. All brush must be placed by the road no later than 7:00 a.m. on Monday, the 21st of September. Crews will make one pass through each subdivision therefore any branches that are not placed by the road when they go by will not be picked up at a later time. Branches should be a minimum of 4 feet in length to be safely placed in the chipper and no greater than 6 inches

in diameter. They must be placed with their cut ends pointed towards the road in a neat and orderly pile. Branches that cannot be put through the chipper safely will not be taken. Evergreen cuttings must be kept separate from other tree branches and will be picked up separately. This service is being provided for larger branches generated from trimming or storm damage and is not intended for disposal of whole trees that have been removed.

2015 Road Maintenance Program

Each year, the Village pursues a road resurfacing program with the use of Motor Fuel Tax (MFT) dollars it receives. Roads are resurfaced predicated upon a priority list developed upon annual inspections performed by the Public Works Foreman, Village Engineer and members of the Public Works Committee. Last year, the Village pursued



Once again, the Village also set aside some General Fund revenues this year to help patch private roads. This is a departure from past practices, but one that is greatly needed. Despite the maintenance efforts pursued by private road residents, many of these roadways have significantly deteriorated to the point of becoming nearly impassable at times. The Village continues to work with the residents on private roads to provide them opportunities to bring their roads up to Village standards so that they may be fully maintained by the Village however skyrocketing paving costs have made this endeavor very challenging. To insure that emergency vehicles are able to access our residents in time of need, the Village provides some general road maintenance to these roadways. Upon completion of a cost benefit analysis, it was determined that the cost impact was minimal and the community benefit, significant.







Fall Back: Home Preparedness Checklist for Time Change Sunday, November 1, 2015

Autumn is right around the corner and Time Change Sunday is on the way!

On the first Sunday in November, we come to the end of Daylight Saving Time. As you circle the house, resetting clocks, take time for this short safety checklist to make your home safer.

Change the clocks and the batteries. Smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors save lives ... if they're powered on by a fresh battery. Safety experts recommend replacing smoke and carbon monoxide detector batteries twice a year--so celebrate Time Change Sunday with fresh batteries all around.



Energy savings hint: don't toss the replaced batteries just yet. While they're likely not fully charged, replaced batteries can still do duty in children's toys, media players or electronic devices. Squeeze the last drop of power out of them before you recycle!

Replace light bulbs. Long dark winter evenings call for a little illumination! Since you'll have stepladders out to reach smoke detectors and clocks, double up on safety (and energy savings) by checking for light bulbs and fixtures. Consider replacing conventional bulbs with energy-efficient compact fluorescent or LCD bulbs.







The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency estimates that replacing standard bulbs with energy-efficient ones saves over \$30 in electricity costs over their lifetime.

Prepare for cold and flu season. With the cooler weather comes colds and flu. Check your medicine cabinet and assess stocks of over-the-counter medications. Make sure you have sufficient non-aspirin fever reducers, cough syrup, and decongestants needed to fight colds or flu. In the pantry, a stockpile of canned soup and lemon-lime soda can ease cold symptoms and fight off dehydration--and don't forget to stock up on disposable tissues for all those coughs and sneezes!

Make or review your family emergency plan. If an emergency strikes, will your family know what to do? Review your family's emergency plan, or create one for the first time. Update phone numbers, addresses and contact information, and post an Emergency Information Page near the phone.






Johnsburg Lions Club Events
