

President's Letter

I hope that you enjoyed a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. At the Village, we are all eager to be welcoming in a new year full of exciting challenges and new opportunities for our community. In looking back on 2014, one can see that much has been accomplished. In May, the efforts of the Rescue Squad Retired were recognized at the official dedication of Rescue Squad Memorial Park. Shortly thereafter, they were presented with a Proclamation from the McHenry County Board for their many years of service, generous donations and contributions to our community. It was a great pleasure to honor these dedicated men and women who served our community.



County Board Proclamation

St. Johns the Baptist Catholic Church was honored on June 29, 2014 by the McHenry County Historical Society in recognition of its historic and architectural significance to Johnsburg and McHenry County. This is such an amazing honor and we are proud to have it in our community.

In March of 2014, Johnsburg School District 12 passed a referendum for bonds to pursue building maintenance improvements to insure that our children have proper facilities to meet their educational needs.

The completion of the roundabout along with the streetscape enhancements surpassed our expectations. Beautiful hanging baskets, the majority of which were donated by Marilou and John Huemann of Joseph Huemann & Sons Well Drilling, contribute to the new character and feel of the downtown area. New banners were also purchased by the Johnsburg Area Business Association (JABA). Recently, the project was recognized as the "Project of the Year" for the Fox Valley region by the American Public Works Association (APWA). We have had many positive reactions from the community about the effectiveness of the roundabout and are very pleased with the completed project.

In 2014, the Village Board voted to eliminate vehicle stickers upon completion of a detailed cost analysis performed under the direction of Trustee Mary Lou Hutchinson and the Finance Committee. The analysis reflected that the program was not cost effective. The implementation of the video gaming tax provides a new revenue stream to cover the cost of street lighting in lieu of revenues previously derived from the sale of vehicle stickers. In March of 2014, the Village's bond rating was raised to AA+. We are very proud of this achievement and are thankful to Trustee Hutchinson, the Finance Committee and Village Staff for their important role in making this possible.

The Community Affairs Committee, under the direction of Trustee Janice Sisk, coordinated a "Smoke Free Parks" contest. Many students submitted artwork for the contest. Congratulations to Maddie Stevens for her winning artwork that is being utilized on signage being placed at all Village parks marking them as "Smoke Free".

Much thanks to Trustee Greg Klemstein for his generous donation of \$1,000 to be used towards the purchase of a snow blower to clear snow from the Village's ice rink. I would also like to thank John Huemann of Joseph Huemann and Sons Well Drilling for donating the material necessary to extend water service to the ice rink and to Gary Brand, owner of Maple Cable for donating the manpower and equipment necessary to perform the directional boring needed to install the water line.

We would also like to thank the Johnsburg Lion's for their



- Reuse or recycle all fluorescent tubes and bulbs, batteries and electronics
 - Direct water from outdoor washing of mats and vehicles to sanitary sewer

Save Some Water for the Fish!

McHenry County is 100% dependent on groundwater for ALL of its drinking water, and this supply is limited. Additionally, our groundwater and our lakes, rivers and streams are all connected. Therefore, to ensure that the water resources are sustained and available, it is important to learn ways that you can reduce water use – which can indirectly save you money on your water bill too!

Watering the flowers or a garden is just one activity that consumes a great deal of water, time and energy; however, this is also one of the easiest places in our yards to cut back by using a rain garden. A rain garden is a shallow depression in your yard that is designed to collect excess rainwater and runoff from your rooftops, sump pumps, and patio/driveway areas. These areas are then planted with native plants that are adapted to the climate of Northeastern Illinois, thereby requiring less water. Rain gardens provide an effective alternative to using our drinking water supply groundwater.

Not only do rain gardens reduce the amount of yardwork but they also are environmentally friendly. Rain gardens help to filter pollutants to keep our water supply clean, they return water to the water cycle and to groundwater, and the plants help to improve the soil by increasing its ability to absorb water and remove carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. Furthermore they serve as a habitat for birds, butterflies and many other beneficial insects. Finally, they remove pollutants from stormwater, thus decreasing the impacts to our aquatic friends, including fish.

How To Construct a Rain Garden?

The construction of a rain garden is very straightforward. Just choose a spot at least 10 feet from your house and away from the septic tank to prevent flooding and harm to the septic tank. Try to select a naturally occurring low spot in either full or partial sun. Then direct your downspouts and sump pump to this depression either by using a buried 4" PVC pipe or by digging a shallow swale (linear depression). As a good rule of thumb, a rain garden is generally 5 to 10% the size of the impermeable area (such as roof tops or pavement) that provides the runoff for the garden. To determine the size of your garden measure the square footage of the impermeable area and then multiply by 20% if you have sandy soil; 30-35% for loam; and 45-60% for clay. This will help to ensure that the garden holds as much water as possible while also not drowning the plants by collecting too much. Once the location and size are chosen, dig the garden 4 – 8 inches deep (Call JULIE to make sure utilities are not present) and mix with 2 – 3 inches of sand to improve water infiltration.

Not only is location and size important to the success of the rain garden but plant selection also helps to ensure that the garden will function properly. When selecting plants, visit your local nursery or the University of Illinois Master Gardeners website http://web.extension.illinois.edu/mg/ to select native plants that are suited to our climate and soil. Some of these species include the Purple Coneflower, the Black-eyed Susan, the New Jersey Tea, and Switch Grass. Young plants or plugs work the best for raingardens since they are easier to establish and maintain. Once the plants are planted apply mulch and water every other day for the first two weeks. After the garden is established, additional watering or fertilizer should not be needed. Simply sit back and enjoy the new addition to your lawn. Rain gardens provide a maintenance free approach to landscaping and are environmentally friendly. Rain gardens are one approach to protecting and preserving our finite groundwater supply. Village Services Survey 2 & A

In November, the Village conducted an online survey to solicit input on Village Services. The survey results can be viewed on our website at johnsburg.org. In reviewing the comments submitted in the survey, several questions were repeatedly raised. The following is a summary of the most frequently asked questions followed by answers and clarification. The Finance Committee and Village Board will be discussing the survey responses and potential changes to Village services over the next several weeks. If you have any questions or need additional information, please contact the Village Hall at 815-385-6023.

Q: One of the options in the survey related to residential garbage and recycling collection is to directly bill each household for the service. Isn't it less expensive if the Village contracts with one hauler on behalf of all residents?

A: The Village currently contracts with one hauler on behalf of all residents to insure we achieve the best possible rates. That will continue even if direct billing is instituted. The Village has a contract with the current hauler that guarantees rates through 2021.

Q: Why doesn't the Village seek bids for garbage services in order to obtain the best pricing possible and switch to a less costly garbage company?

A: The Village does pursue bids for garbage and recycling services in order to obtain the most competitive rates. Our current hauler was the low bidder and the Village's rates are one of the lowest in the county.

Q: Why doesn't the Village save money by cutting the school district's administration payroll by combining schools and thereby eliminating duplicative positions?

A: While the schools may choose to consider different approaches in order to attain financial goals, these changes would not impact the Village and its operations. Johnsburg School District is a separate taxing body and the Village has no authority to make decisions on behalf of the school. Additionally, the school district's operations and spending do not bear upon the Village's finances.

Q: Why doesn't the Village eliminate police pensions and require police officers to contribute to personal retirement plans like the rest of us?

A: The Village has no legal authority to eliminate the police pension program as it is mandated by State Law.

Q: Why don't the police officers contribute towards their pension program?

A: Police officers do contribute towards the police pension program.

Q: If the Village needs additional funds to support services, why did the Village pursue the roundabout?

A: The Johnsburg Road Improvement/Roundabout project was a County project and was funded by the County and was partially support by grants. The Village is supportive of the improvements and worked closely with the County throughout the planning, design and construction however it was not a Village project. The Village pursued the streetscape enhancements with the help of a grant covering 80% of the costs. The roundabout was determined to be the ideal option for managing traffic at the intersection when considering traffic management, safety and cost.

Q: If the Village needs additional funds to support services, why did the Village eliminate vehicle stickers?

A: The Village eliminated the vehicle sticker program after performing a comprehensive review of the program. The results of a detailed cost analysis revealed that the program demanded a great deal of manpower and resulted in minimal net revenues and was therefore not cost effective.





Q: Why doesn't the Village reduce or eliminate spending to offset the need for additional revenues?

A: For several years the Village has pursued significant budget reductions and operational changes to reduce costs and balance the budget. These reductions and changes helped considerably, however, the Village cannot afford to provide direct services without established revenue streams to cover their costs. The Village's refuse and recycling program is a good example since more than 40% of the cost of residential service is being subsidized by the general fund, a practice unique to Johnsburg. To lessen the garbage burden on the Village's budget, the Village Board approved a \$30,000 cost savings in 2010 by limiting residential garbage pickup to one 35 gallon container per household. While this change resulted in a temporary savings, it does not provide for a long-term solution. Over the past fourteen (14) years, the General Fund has subsidized the residential garbage and recycling program by \$1,319,300. Under its current structure, the program will require an additional \$1,364,341 from the general fund over the next six (6) years if changes are not implemented.

Q: Why doesn't the Village permit leaf burning every day of the week so that everyone would not be burning on the weekends resulting in a heavy smoke concentration in the air?

A: The Village is required to enforce the burning regulations instituted by the McHenry County Department of Health, which restricts burning to weekends during the months of April, May, October and November.

Q: I already pay a lot of money in taxes to the Village. Why can't Village officials scale back on spending so

that taxes can be reduced rather than increased constantly?

A: The Village has implemented operational changes resulting in significant cost reductions over the past 6 years. However, its important to understand the Village receives only 5.6% of the amount you pay in property taxes each year in order to provide all Village services including but not limited to facility/park maintenance, snow plowing, sanitation, police safety, garbage & recycling, road maintenance, etc. The remaining amount is disbursed per the adjacent chart:


Economic Development News

The Economic Development Committee has now completed the "Stakeholder" input portion of our visioning process. Stakeholders are all owners/ operators of properties that are located within the boundaries of our proposed Downtown District. The input from our stakeholder's completes the second phase of our resident data collection process. A Village wide survey was completed in the summer of 2014. A "draft" concept will be formalized using the data collected and presented to all our Johnsburg residents later this spring. More information will be available at the Johnsburg Business Expo, which will be held at the Johnsburg High School on March 14th. We hope you will participate in the process of developing a SUSTAINABLE plan for the future development/ redevelopment of our Historic Downtown area.



How Municipal Government Works -Board of Police Commissioners

The Board of Police Commissioners of the Village of Johnsburg derives its authority from the Illinois Municipal Code, Illinois Compiled Statutes and from Village of Johnsburg Ordinances.

The Commission's role is primarily defined by three statutorily defined responsibilities. The first is the process of recruitment, selection, and appointment of qualified candidates to fill vacancies, for original appointments, of full-time police officers. The second responsibility is the testing of qualified officers in the promotional process for the position of Sergeant. The final responsibility is to conduct disciplinary hearings or appeals of disciplinary action in the police department.

The Board commissioners are appointed by the Village President with the consent of the Board. Each of the three (3) members serve a three year staggered term. All of the members must be electors of the Village of Johnsburg and must have no felony convictions. Candidates cannot be related to any elected or appointed village official and must not already hold an office with the Village. The Board of Commissioners serve a crucial role to the community as they are entrusted to select and promote the best and most qualified individuals to safeguard the lives and property of everyone in our community.

What You Can Do To Prevent Water Pollution

If you want to help keep our waters clean, there are many things you can do to help. You can prevent water pollution of nearby rivers and lakes as well as groundwater and drinking water by following some simple guidelines in your everyday life.

- Be careful about what you throw down your sink or toilet. Don't throw paints, oils or other forms of litter down the drain.
- Be aware that many chemicals commonly used around the home are toxic. Select less-toxic alternatives. Use non-toxic substitutes wherever possible.
- Use environmentally friendly household products, such as low-phosphate or phosphate-free detergents.
- Never pour unwanted chemicals on the ground. Soil cannot purify most chemicals, and they could eventually contaminate runoff.
- When landscaping your yard, select plants that have low requirements for water, fertilizers and pesticides.
- Preserve existing trees, and plant trees and shrubs to help prevent erosion and promote infiltration of water into the soil.
- Leave lawn clippings on your lawn so that nutrients in the clippings are recycled and less yard waste goes into landfills.











